

An in-depth examination of North Carolina voter attitudes on important current issues

Registered Voters in North Carolina

Date: November 1-5, 2023

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Key Insights

The Meredith Poll conducted a survey of North Carolina registered voters. The online sample--from Dynata--used a quota based on the most recent US Census estimates of North Carolina to sample our respondents. After the survey was completed, we **weighted** the survey for **gender**, **party affiliation**, **geographic location**, **race and ethnicity**, and **education** so that our sample most closely resembles North Carolina.

The sample had 755 respondents, giving us a confidence interval of +/-3.5%. The survey was in the field November 1-5, 2023.

Primary and General Election Preferences

Republican Presidential Primary

Former President Donald Trump holds a commanding lead over his Republican challengers in North Carolina. Over half (51%) of respondents indicating they were likely to vote in the Republican primary next March supported Trump with Ron DeSantis being the only other candidate to have double digit support (14%). The remaining candidates got little to no support from likely Republican voters.

"Trump's lead in North Carolina seems very consistent since the last administration of the Meredith Poll. Even with Republicans dropping out of the race, there seems to be no momentum for any of Trump's challengers in the state," said Meredith Poll Director David McLennan.

Republican Gubernatorial Primary

Lieutenant Governor Mark Robinson holds a large lead over his Republican challengers for the party's nomination for governor. Just over forty percent of likely Republican primary voters (41%) indicate a preference for Robinson. No other candidate, including newly announced candidate Bill Graham gets more than five percent of the Republican primary vote. However, a plurality of likely primary voters (42%) indicated that they had not made up their minds.

In our survey, Robinson does well with all groups of Republicans, but particularly with the most conservative primary voters, older Republicans, and those with less education.

"Mark Robinson has a significant lead with just under five months until voting begins in the N.C. primary, but a large number of Republican voters are undecided. There could be a competitive primary, but it looks unlikely unless one of Robinson's challengers catches fire," said David McLennan.

Democratic Gubernatorial Primary

Attorney General Josh Stein retains a healthy lead (38-11%) lead over Mike Morgan for the Democratic nomination for governor. Although a plurality of Democratic primary voters (42%) say they are undecided with five months until the election, Morgan has yet to convince this large group of voters that he is the alternative to Stein,

Although Stein is favored among most demographic groups, Morgan retains strength among Black voters, younger voters, and evangelical voters.

"The high number of undecided voters is no surprise five months before the primary election. For many primary voters, the campaign does not begin in earnest until after the holidays," said David McLennan. "It may be difficult for Morgan to overcome Stein's advantages that include a strong campaign war chest and the endorsement of Governor Roy Cooper."

Trump-Biden Matchup

Although it is very premature to survey voters on a Trump-Biden matchup in the 2024 general election, our results confirmed what most election watchers believe — we are going to have a very tight contest for North Carolina's 16 Electoral College votes. Our results had Biden edging Trump by a narrow margin (40-39%) with 17 percent of respondents indicating that they preferred someone else. The results are well within our confidence interval, meaning this race could go either way.

"Given our recent presidential election history in North Carolina, we should expect to see one of the major party nominees win the state by a few points or less," said David McLennan. "The results we have are not predictive of a winner, especially given the volatility we are likely to see during the next year."

Robinson-Stein Matchup

Just as with the general election matchups between presidential candidates, the matchup between Mark Robinson and Josh Stein produced very close results. In our survey, Stein prevailed over Robinson by two points (38-36%), with almost one in five voters indicating that they were not sure. These results are also well within the confidence interval (3.5%).

"North Carolina may not be a 50-50 state in the strictest sense, but North Carolinians should expect a tightly contested governor's race next year, no matter who the major parties nominate," said David McLennan. "We should see record amounts of money spent on this race and the results of this election could have a profound effect on the future of the state."

Approval of President, Vice President, and Governor

Presidential Job Approval

Just 42 percent of North Carolinians approve of the job Joe Biden is doing as president, while 56 percent of respondents indicate they disapprove of Biden's job performance. Only 14 percent strongly approve of Biden's work as president, while 40 percent strongly disapprove.

Biden's approval had declined over the last year within the groups of voters he most needs to win reelection, including Black voters (66% approval), Hispanic voters (53% approval), and among Gen Z voters (34% approval).

"Joe Biden's chances of winning North Carolina's Electoral College votes appear shaky with just over twelve months until Election Day in 2024," said David McLennan. "Seeing his approval drop among the youngest voters to 34% is problematic for the Biden campaign. It

is clear that Bident's support for Israel in its war against Hamas in Gaza is one of the major drivers of this sharp decline."

Vice Presidential Job Approval

Vice President Kamala Harris' approval ratings mirror those of President Joe Biden. Just over 40 percent (41%) of the respondents approve of Harris's performance as vice president, with 52 percent disapproving.

"Kamala Harris' job approval mirrors that of Joe Biden's as president," said David McLennan. "There is no evidence that she is a drag on the ticket or that people fear her worse than Biden."

Gubernatorial Job Approval

Governor Roy Cooper's job approval numbers remain strong with 60 percent of North Carolinians approving his job performance, while just 34 percent disapproving. Cooper's job approval numbers are above 50 percent with all groups except for Republicans and those who self-identify as "conservative" or "very conservative."

"Governors typically have higher approval numbers than presidents or legislators," said David McLennan. "Roy Cooper's job approval numbers, especially in a state with such a strong partisan divide, are remarkable."

Opinion of Joe Biden and Donald Trump

A direct comparison of people's overall opinion of Joe Biden and Donald Trump reveals an obvious truth–neither is considered very favorably. Biden has a slight, although statistically insignificant advantage over Trump in terms of approval (43-40%) and disapproval (55-57%).

Although most of the demographic groups break in predictable ways, it is the Gen Z voters that continue to surprise. Trump's approval rating among 18-24 year olds is 53 percent, while Biden's is 37 percent. It is worth noting that Gen Z males are twice as likely to approve of Donald Trump than Gen Z females.

"Scholars have been noting the divide among young male and young female voters on political issues and leaders," said David McLennan. "The result showing that Gen Z males are so supportive of Donald Trump, while Gen Z women are not, may make for very interesting discussions on college campuses and online for the next year."

Identification of Political Leaders in North Carolina

We wanted to continue testing whether North Carolinians could identify political leaders from their photographs. This time we added women who serve (Secretary of State Elaine Marshall) or have served (former Labor Commissioner Cherie Berry) in statewide political offices to the mix. The results were similar to those we reported last month. With the photos, a majority of North Carolinians could identify Lt. Governor Mark Robinson (56%), but fewer could identify Attorney General Josh Stein's photograph (42%). The women were less recognizable–37% could identify Berry and 34% could identify Marshall.

"There is little surprise that most political figures in North Carolina are only known by some citizens. Even the "Elevator Lady" Cherie Berry was not known by a majority of respondents, even though her photo was in every elevator. Mark Robinson probably benefits from the fact that he is nationally recognized and gets many cable news mentions," said David McLennan.

Perceptions of the Political Parties, Including No Labels and Unaffiliated Voters Knowledge and Perceptions of the Major Parties

Many North Carolinians know little about the political parties in the state or how the process parties use to select their general election candidates works.

Just over half (53%) know that North Carolina has a semi-closed primary system, meaning that only those registered with the specific political party and unaffiliated voters can vote in that party's primary. Most troubling was the fact that just over half of the unaffiliated voters in our survey knew that they could vote in a primary of one of the recognized political parties in the state.

Also, only a small minority of respondents–6 percent–know that the largest group of voters is unaffiliated voters. Even those who are unaffiliated voters–only 14%--knew that this group of voters was the largest in the state. A plurality of respondents (45%) considered Republicans to be the largest group of voters in North Carolina.

In terms of perceptions about the ideologies of Democratic, Republican, and unaffiliated voters, stereotypes exist. Large majorities of respondents said Democrats were mostly liberal (61%), Republicans were mostly conservative (73%), and unaffiliated voters were mostly moderate (52%), although one in five people said they did not know about unaffiliated voters.

"Very little is known about unaffiliated voters in North Carolina. Despite abundant news stories touting the growth of unaffiliated voters in the state, most people think this group is equivalent to registered Libertarian Party voters in terms of size," said David McLennan. "There is also the perception that registered Democrats and Republicans are more ideologically extreme than they actually are. As our survey results indicate, only 24 percent of North Carolinians consider themselves very conservative or very liberal."

No Labels Party

Within the political chattering class, the "No Labels" Party is controversial. Some, like at the Lincoln Project, see it as a Republican funded attempt to draw voters from Joe Biden and elect Donald Trump. Others see No Labels as a legitimate third party that can be a home for political moderates. Our results indicate that this debate, which rages on social media and cable network shows, has not affected most North Carolinians.

Only 20 percent of our respondents knew some or a lot about No Labels, while 52 percent knew nothing at all. Likewise, less than 20 percent said they would consider voting for candidates running under the No Labels banner. However, when asked about whether this party would have a positive impact on the political system or be disruptive, our

respondents were almost evenly split, with 34 percent stating No Labels would be disruptive and 37 percent thinking the party would have a positive impact.

"The No Labels Party may become a political force in North Carolina, but right now there are very few North Carolinians paying attention to this party," said David McLennan. "Given that only 2,655 voters are registered for this party, out of over 7.3 million voters in N.C., it does not appear as this party has gained much traction yet."

Civic Knowledge

Since it is widely <u>reported</u> that Americans' knowledge of civics is abysmal, we decided to test North Carolinians on their knowledge of civics—both U.S. civics and North Carolina civics. We chose five comparable questions in each area. The results demonstrated that North Carolinians know decidedly less about government institutions and practices in the state than they do the nation. Below is a simple comparison between the percentage of correct responses for each question.


Not only do North Carolinians know less about North Carolina government and politics than they do about United States government and politics, but there were some major differences among groups in the state. Unaffiliated voters in the state generally knew more than did those who affiliate with the Democratic or Republican parties. The most significant finding was that young voters (18-24 years old) know significantly less than do older voters on national and state civics.

"The fact that our youngest voters know significantly less about state government and politics than older voters should concern us all," said David McLennan. "I know there are efforts to improve civic education in the state. Those efforts need to be redoubled."

Direction of State and Country

Direction of the Country

Dissatisfaction with the direction of the country continues to decline, as almost three-quarters of our respondents indicate they do not like what is going on in the country. Although our results do not point to a specific cause for this increasing decline, there is obvious concern about the economy, world events, and a general apprehension about the political system that affect these results.



In terms of demographics, all groups—partisan, age, etc.—were dissatisfied with the direction of the country. The only groups with small satisfaction gaps (the difference between satisfaction and dissatisfaction) were the youngest respondents and those self-identified as being the "most liberal" in terms of political ideology.


Meredith Poll Director David McLennan states: "The levels of dissatisfaction with the direction of the country are at almost near-record levels. As we head into an election year, expect both political parties to use this dissatisfaction and blame the other party for the

woes of the country. This promises to be one of the most negative political campaign years in history."

Direction of the State

North Carolinians are less dissatisfied with the direction of North Carolina, but in our most recent survey, the gap between satisfaction and dissatisfaction has increased. Now, just 36 percent of our respondents are satisfied with the direction of the state and 53 percent are dissatisfied—virtually unchanged from September.

"The sharp increase in dissatisfaction with the direction of the state, after being relatively stable for years, is significant," states David McLennan. "There could be many reasons for this decrease in satisfaction and increase in dissatisfaction, but the most likely explanation is that the mood about national politics is affecting state politics. In other words, people are no longer distinguishing things going on at the national level from things going on in North Carolina."

Methodological Information

Mode: Online

Population: N.C. Registered Voters 18+

Dates in the field: November 1-5, 2023

Sample Size: 755

Credibility Interval: +/- 3.5%

Weighting Variables (NC): Gender, Education, Location (Urban, Rural, and Suburban counties). Political Party, and Race and Ethnicity.

Procedures: The Meredith Poll used an online sample provided by Dynata. Participants were recruited into the sample by Dynata and received small amounts of compensation in exchange for their opinions. The survey was not an open-link, posted on social media, but rather was by direct invitation to a very large national pool of people who agree to take online surveys. More information about the Dynata panels and quality tests are available here. Quotas on demographic variables such as gender, race, etc. were applied prior to online survey commencement.

Online interviews were included in the final dataset if respondents spent a minimum length of time on the interview and particular sections, and if a respondent progressed through the entire survey. Respondents were recruited to the survey with a generic description about the fall elections.

Credibility Interval

Unlike a traditional random digit-dial telephone survey, online surveys do not have a traditional margin of error. Non-Probability quota samples like these do not adhere to assumptions of random selection. To account for uncertainty inherent in any sample-based research design, we provide a credibility interval. More information about this technique can be found here. The credibility interval was calculated by inflating traditional confidence intervals by a design effect calculated using the squared sum of weights. For this North Carolina sample, this means: (1.0 * 2.5= 3.5). We round these values up for presentation of results. As with all surveys, Total survey error often exceeds sampling error.

Weighting Information

Weights were generated in Qualtrics using a technique known as iterative proportional fitting, also known as raking. The weight variable was calculated based on the variables in the table below.

The demographic information was obtained through self-report--respondents answered closed ended questions.

Model—we used the 2020 US Census estimates, the estimates provided from the UNC Demography Center, and the current statistics on voter registrations in NC (from the NC State Board of Elections) for our weighting.
